### Working People Have the Power

would like to extend congratulations on behalf of Local 338 to the Amazon workers on Staten Island on becoming the first Amazon warehouse in the country to unionize! Watching their fight to improve their working conditions has been incredible, and we could not be happier that these workers felt empowered enough to come together and make the decision to form a union. The recent push for unionization amona Amazon workers. including at the warehouse Bessemer. Alabama. remarkable and a clear showing of the growing strength of our nation's labor movement. We are still waiting on the final results from the election in Alabama, but the current ballot count for that warehouse has been close for a state that's not very pro-union. We stand in solidarity with these workers, and hope they stay strong in their fight for unionization!

The primary for the 2022 midterm elections will be here before we know it—I encourage our members to check their voter registration and begin

making a plan to vote. Although it is not a Presidential election year, we cannot underestimate the importance of this election. Voting for your representatives on the state and local level is just as important as voting represent for those who Washington, vou in D.C. These representatives enact legislation that will directly affect your quality of life in New York—you must show up and support candidates who will fight for you and your rights as working people. When the labor movement doesn't vote, we risk losing key allies in local, state and federal government who are going to fight to ensure your rights are protected.

Governor Hochul is among the politicians who leads with the best interests of workers in mind. Her State budget was recently passed and includes several key victories for New York's working families to help our state continue to recover from the pandemic. Included in the budget are investments in clean energy, upgrades to our transportation infrastructure, and an unprecedented \$31.5

billion investment in New York's education system. The 2023 budget has also eased the tax burden on New York's middle-class by reducing tax rates and suspending fuel taxes beginning in June. Her commitment to New York's working people is evident, which is why it is critical that Local 338 members show up to support her on Primary Day.

Local 338 is still collecting donations for the ongoing crisis in Ukraine—we're accepting everything from nonperishable food, medical supplies, clothing, and more. You can check your My Local 338 account for a full list of what we are accepting as donations. We are working with local organizations to ensure that what is collected is sent directly to Ukrainians in need. If you would like to donate, you may drop it off at the Local 338 office or you can reach out to your Union Representative to schedule a pickup. Local 338 members have always been supportive of those who need it most, and I know this time will be no different.











## Honoring the Lives of Those We've Lost on Workers' Memorial Day

Workers' Memorial Day is recognized on April 28th each year and is a day dedicated to remembering those who have been injured, fallen ill, or have lost their lives while on the job. This year, Local 338 members and representatives gathered in stores across New York to commemorate the workers we lost over the last year. We stood together in solidarity during a moment of silence at 10 AM to honor the people who went to work and never came home.

The last two years have been incredibly difficult for essential workers, including our membership, all of whom worked on the front lines of the pandemic to support their communities and ensure they were able to continue to buy groceries and essential resources, refill their medical prescriptions, or receive the critical care they needed. It is because of their sacrifice that so many of us are able to continue our lives as normal.

On Workers' Memorial Day and beyond, we honor the sacrifices of those lost by continuing the fight to ensure that all workers have access to safe working conditions. We will ensure our elected officials, employers, and the public remember and respect the risks and sacrifices our members have taken.























### Working People Are Reclaiming Their Power

Over the last several months, we've seen workers across the country take back their power and work together to improve their working conditions. After two years of a pandemic where much of our essential workforce has had to put their lives and health on the line to support themselves and their families, workers have had enough. They're tired of being underpaid and taken advantage of by their employers, and through the help of a union, working people are organizing to ensure they are given the workplace rights and protections they are entitled to.



An excellent example of the rise in worker power is the recent wave of Starbucks workers across the United States joining Starbucks Workers United. There are dozens of locations across the country that have already filed to unionize, including some

of the most recent right here in New York. The store that sparked this surge in unionization efforts began in Buffalo when workers at that location filed to unionize in December 2021.

We also saw workers at an Amazon warehouse on Staten Island unionize just this month, the very first Amazon warehouse in the country to successfully unionize. Workers there knew what they were fighting for and resisted the company's despicable attempt at union busting to stop them from winning their unionization vote. We should all be supporting these workers at Starbucks and Amazon as they fight for dignity and respect on the job and a decent life for working families!

Worker power is not just being seen in organizing, but in new contracts-most recently for the workers in our sister locals of the UFCW in California and New England. These workers have won massive victories for themselves in these contracts, a direct result of them being active in their union. They participated in their union through member meetings, attending rallies and protests in solidarity, and being union allies to workers who are on the path towards unionization. It is proof that when we come together as a labor movement, we can accomplish anything, including contracts that reflect what workers want to see in their workplaces. We encourage Local 338 members to reach out when it's time for contract negotiations, and to come out to events we hold-including the upcoming member meeting on June 15th. When we have an open line of communications with our members, it allows us to negotiate a better contract on your behalf.

This year, New York legislators have had the opportunity to redraw congressional, senate, and assembly maps across the state. However, there have been some last-minute changes to the electoral layout of the state and a judge is requiring that the Congressional and Senate maps are redrawn, postponing the Primary Election for Congressional and Senate races to August 23. The Primary Election for statewide and Assembly races will be on June 28th.

There are a lot of important seats on the ballot this year, and we encourage Local 338 members to make sure they get out to vote—we believe that these candidates are the best option for working families across New York. They have and will continue to show up for the labor movement and fight for working people! If you can't make it to the ballot box on Primary Day, you can vote early. Attorney General Tish James is an advocate for every New Yorker. She's spent her political career holding the powerful accountable, and as Attorney General has prosecuted employers who steal wages and deny workers benefits and has taken steps to ensure that workers are safe on the job throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Tish has prioritized making New York a more equitable place for everyone, a fight she's guaranteed to continue if re-elected as Attorney General.

#### **Tom DiNapoli for Comptroller**

During his time as Comptroller, Tom DiNapoli has exposed corruption and recovered more than \$50 million dollars in misuse of taxpayer funds, grew state pension funds, and pressed companies to address climate change. He's been a progressive leader, working to ensure that corporate boards and talent pools are more inclusive of women and minorities, and created more transparency in local government through the creation of the Fiscal Stress Monitoring System, which allows taxpayers to learn more about how their communities are using their funds. The Importance of Being Politically Active

This year is a midterm election year—meaning several local, state, and federal elected officials are running for re-election. It is important to make sure you're ready to cast your ballot and have a plan to vote! Part of the plan means researching the candidates running in your district and registering to vote if you haven't. Registering to vote is very easy-the form takes less than two minutes to fill out. Your Union Representative can help you fill it out the next time they visit your shop, or if you want to register online, the DMV has a form on their website that you can fill out instead. The deadline to register to vote is June 3, 2022. Being politically active is an important part of being a union member—your vote helps get candidates into office who will fight for your rights as working people.

The leadership at Local 338 also works with local politicians to ensure that they are passing legislation that supports our members and all working people. This is made possible by contributions to the Local 338 Political Action Committee (PAC). Members can sign up to make a small contribution to our PAC by filling out the <u>form on our website</u> or by asking your Union Representative for a form the next time they visit your shop. These contributions start at 25

cents a week and max out at \$1.90 per week. We ask for our members' support in contributing to our PAC because it helps us boost politicians who have a proven track record of fighting for working people and passing legislation that will help protect and expand the rights of workers throughout New York.

In addition, I hope you'll keep an eye out for increased Local 338 presence in your store—as the world begins to return to normal, our representatives will be spending time in your shops conducting extensive general visits and holding "Union Days". Union days are shop visits where our representatives will be discussing more than just contract issues, they will focus on the various benefits the Union offers and can provide. As always, if you have any questions for your union, you can reach out to your Union or Funds Representative directly through your My Local 338 account.




"I wouldn't be able to retire when I wanted to if it wasn't for the union," he said.







