Celebrating A Strong Year for Our Union

It's hard to believe that 2022 is already coming to a close. It feels like just yesterday we were outlining our plans for the year and what we had hoped to accomplish for our union!

2022 has been a welcome return to normal for Local 338. After two years apart, we were finally able to return to in-person events and meetings! It has been wonderful getting to meet with the membership in person once again, either at union events or membership meetings. Local 338 is stronger than ever, which was clear at the 2022 Labor Day Parade in New York City, where our membership turned out in great numbers to march up Fifth Avenue!

We've welcomed new members from different industries across New York, including in cannabis, agriculture, grocery and more. It's something I hope to see continue in 2023—the labor movement is only getting stronger, which is evident in the growing wave of unionizations

happening nationwide, and I'm proud to say that Local 338 has played an important role in unionizing several industries right here in New York.

In August, the workers at Palmer and Paumanok in Aquebogue became the second group of farmworkers in New York to unionize, and we proudly welcomed them to our union family! We are beginning negotiations with Palmer and Paumanok, and while we had hoped to have a strong contract for our members at Pindar Vineyards by the end of this year, we are still deep in negotiations with the company.

Our negotiating team is working around the clock to bring Pindar back to the negotiating table so we can bargain a fair contract for these workers! We have been picketing to show the company that we're serious about getting our members the wages and benefits they deserve—thank you to the volunteers, activists, and union members who have continued to show up each weekend to picket in solidarity

with these workers! We look forward to securing their contract next year.

We now represent over 90% of the state's medicinal cannabis industry from seed to sale. Cannabis workers across New York are choosing unionization for their workplace, helping maintain the standard for the industry, and we could not be prouder to be your representatives! Local 338's cannabis team is working towards organizing the rest of the medicinal industry and we are looking forward to the establishment of New York's adultuse industry in 2023.

This year has been an incredibly busy one for our union, and I look forward to continuing our work in the new year! I send my best to all members of Local 338 and their families, and I hope you have a wonderful holiday season with plenty of time to relax with loved ones!

Introducing Local 338's New Recorder, Rosa Lafontaine

On November 29, 2022, Rosa Lafontaine was elected by the Local 338 Executive Board to serve as our next recorder. Rosa first became a member of the Local 338 family in 1987, when she was a member working at Gristedes. Her passion for the union movement was evident during her time as a member, and that carried into her job as an organizer when she joined the Local 338 team in 2000.

As an organizer, Rosa used her experience as a member in the shops of our union to explain to workers the benefit a union can make in your workplace—along with the possibility of higher wages, better benefits and safer working conditions, a union is there to protect your rights while on the job! After working as an organizer for 4 years, Rosa became a Funds/Service Representative and began servicing Local 338 shops across Manhattan, where she helped educate members on the benefits they receive through their union contract.

In 2005, Rosa was promoted to Union Representative, a role she still holds today! She proudly represents workers across the West Side of Manhattan and northern New Jersey, in shops like Duane Reade, Morton Williams, Gristedes, and Housing Works. Her new role as Recorder is one she is extremely proud to fulfill.

Take Advantage of These Great Scholarship Opportunities for Local 338 Members and Their Dependents

Local 338 RWDSU/UFCW Scholarship Awards Program

The 2023 Local 338 Charities Inc. Scholarship Awards Program is open to Local 338 Members (or their dependents) who are active members of the union and have been for at least one (1) year from the date the Short Form Application is due on March 17, 2023. Please note this scholarship program is open to students who are currently enrolled as high school seniors, currently enrolled in college or trade/vocational school, or will be pursuing their master's or doctorate degree in the fall.

Suffolk County Community College

Two new scholarship opportunities are now available for Local 338 members and their dependents from the Suffolk County Community College Foundation. Students could be eligible for up to \$2,000 towards the cost of tuition per semester.

You May Be Eligible for Childcare Funding Assistance!

If you're a working parent, you already know the struggles associated with trying to find quality, affordable childcare for your child. As a member of Local 338, you may be eligible for the Facilitated Childcare Enrollment Project, which provides eligible families with funding assistance to ease the cost of childcare. Many members of our union have already been approved for the program and have received thousands of dollars toward the cost of day care and after school programs! In fact, almost \$400,000 has been distributed to Local 338 members over the last several years!

If you work at least 20 hours a week, have children under the age of 13, and meet certain geographic and income requirements, you may be eligible to apply for the subsidy. The program, which has previously only been open to Local 338 members living in the 5 boroughs, expanded to Suffolk County and Upstate New York earlier this year!

If you live within the Five Boroughs: you can verify your eligibility and begin the pre-screening process by visiting: local338.org/childcare

If you live in Upstate New York or Suffolk County: If you live in Albany, Erie, Monroe, Oneida, Onondaga, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady or Suffolk Counties, you can verify your eligibility and begin the pre-screening process by visiting: wdiny.org/childcare

Reclaiming Worker Power in 2022

2022 was the year that workers reclaimed their power. From baristas at Starbucks to warehouse workers at Amazon, workers at REI in Manhattan and even staffers in the House of Representatives, working people across the United States have had enough. This year alone, union elections are up 80% from 2021 with over 75% of those elections being won by the workers—if that doesn't show the strength of the union movement, I don't know what does.

It has been incredibly inspiring to see the strength of the union movement grow across the United States and for more working people to realize just how important it is that they have union representation in the workplace. The workers who are getting involved in the labor movement are passionate and driven to fight for what they want to see in the workplace. We saw that this year with our members at Housing Works, who, after several years of fighting for a contract, finally came to an agreement in July.



Unionization often has a ripple effect: when workers unionize, it shows other working people that not only is unionization possible, but they'll be able to do it with solidarity from people within the movement. For example, the workers at Pindar Vineyards inspired farmworkers across Long Island—earlier this year, we had the privilege of welcoming the farmworkers from Palmer and Paumanok to Local 338. Without the bravery of our members at Pindar Vineyards, the farmworkers from Palmer and Paumanok may not have decided to unionize.

2023 looks like a promising year for working New Yorkers, especially with the expansion of adultuse cannabis, the first licenses for which were finally issued last month. This new industry is going to bring thousands of unionized cannabis jobs to New York and will create brand-new career options for working people statewide. After almost a decade of fighting for adult-use cannabis, it has been rewarding to see how far the state has come on cannabis, and the difference it can make in our state. We look forward to seeing the growth of the industry next year!

I want to wish you and your family a happy and healthy holiday season! I hope you have a chance to spend time with loved ones and catch up with friends and family. This year has been a great one for the labor movement, and I look forward to what next year has in store for Local 338. 

This year has kept the organizing and negotiating teams at Local 338 hard at work as we welcome new members to our union and negotiate strong contracts for Local 338-represented shops across New York. We proudly expanded the number of industries we represent and welcomed new members from across the state to the Local 338 family.

2022 has been a very exciting year for the labor movement nationwide, and New York is no different—our organizing team helped welcome several new workplaces to our union family this year across a variety of industries: the Child Center of New York — Youth Development Division, Lower East Side People's Mutual Housing Association, Housing Works and the agricultural workers at Paumanok and Palmer Vineyards.

With 28 contracts up for renewal in 2022, we completed contract negotiations and delivered strong contracts, including for the members at Duane Reade, Housing Works, and PharmaCann. We look forward to continuing negotiations for a variety of employers in the new year, especially for the workers at Pindar Vineyards and Palmer and Paumanok Vineyards.

Tony became involved in the union movement in the late 1990's, when he was a Teamsters shop steward working for Newark's Emergency Medical Services. As a shop steward, Tony rallied his fellow members to come to membership meetings and stay active within their union. His involvement in the Teamsters as a member led to him joining the staff of the local in 1999.

Tony worked for the Teamsters until 2011, when he went to work for 32BJ SEIU as a field representative, where he represented 6,000 members in the Bronx. He also helped organize workers and represented members across a variety of industries. In August, Tony joined the Local 338 team as a Union Representative representing workers in Manhattan and Brooklyn. He said the most rewarding part about working in the labor movement is being able to make a difference.

"I think the best feeling in the world is when you look at somebody and you know you made their life a little bit better," he said.

Tony is from a union household—his father used to be a member of the UFCW! His father worked at a leather processing plant, and his job was to process the hide before it went on to become leather products. In his free time, Tony enjoys woodworking—he's built cabinets and kitchens from scratch, a skill he picked up from his uncle.
