Going To College? We Can Help!

LOCAL 338 CHARITIES, INC. SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS PROGRAM

The 2017 Local 338 Charities Inc. Scholarship Awards

Program has been expanded starting 2017! The changes for 2017 include the following:

 Dependents of members are now eligible if they graduated high school not just in 2017, but as long ago as two years prior to the year in which the scholarship is awarded (Applicants who are currently enrolled as college students are not eligible).

• And for members who are applying, there is now no restriction to how long ago you may have graduated high school.

- The Book Awards have been increased from \$250 to \$500.
- And scholarships are available not just to those who will be attending college but any accredited educational or vocational program of study.

The Scholarship Committee reviews all applications and awards:

- One individual with the Emanuel Laub Scholarship which is \$1,500 a year for all four years in annual installments (totaling \$6,000);
- 10 individuals with a one-time award of \$1,500 for their first year of continuing education or training; and
- 10 individuals with a Book Award Scholarship, which this year has been increased to \$500 each.

You or your parent must have been a member of the Union for at least one (1) year from the date of the award to be eligible to apply for the scholarship and remain a member until the scholarship is awarded. Applicants who are currently enrolled as college students are not eligible.

When the short form application is received by the Scholarship Committee, you will be sent a long form application, which must be returned to the Local 338 Charities, Inc. Scholarship Awards Committee no later than April 14, 2017.





Right to Work.... For Less

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"Right to Work." This phrase sounds like your right to work is synonymous with your right to receive dignity and respect in your workplace. It sounds like it expresses your right to have good jobs that provide good benefits and will allow you to support



your family. However, the truth is just the opposite as Right to Work ("RTW") is legislation that is deceptively named, and its sole purpose

is to weaken your power as a working person.

Currently, 28 states have passed this legislation under the guise of doing the right thing for working people. Unfortunately, it has done everything but that. In states with "RTW," working men and women

earn less wages and have significantly fewer benefits! In those states, workers earn on average \$6,000 less annually than workers in pro-labor states. Furthermore, workers pay more for health insurance (if they even have access to it), are less likely to have a pension plan, and children are more likely to live in poverty than states where workers are able to collectively bargain for a fair contract. This is what so-called "RTW" (for less) has done to hardworking people, and now Congress has introduced it at the national level.

Don't be fooled, "RTW" is the creation of big

businesses and it is designed to increase corporate profits by taking from its workers. "RTW" legislation would benefit those at the top by offering less to those who make their business a success. If this legislation is passed, it is no question that working New Yorkers will see stagnant wages, increases in health care costs, a less secure retirement and fewer paid days off. "RTW" is just the first step in the business communities' efforts to profit by chipping away at the very benefits you have earned over the years—easily making your right to work, your "right to work for less."

"RTW's" deceptive name was intentionally named to make you think that it will benefit you, but this couldn't be further from the truth. Don't let your ability to support yourself and your family get knocked off the bargaining table.




Have Children in Child Care? We May Be Able to Help!

At Local 338, we pride ourselves in making sure that our members and their families are supported in all of the ways that we can. We also know that child care is an issue for many of our members and taking care of our dependents can be difficult to manage financially at times.

Members of Local 338 who are covered under a Local 338 Benefits Plan are eligible for a partial reimbursement towards the cost of child care. If you have dependent children under the age of 12 who are currently in day-

care, after-school or pre-school programs, then you may be eligible for the Child Care Reimbursement Benefit.*



*Please be aware that the Child Care Reimbursement Benefit will only cover a percentage of the cost of childcare, not the full amount.

Women's Network Child Care Grant



The UFCW Women's Network offers a child care grant, which can provide assistance towards the cost of child care. Simply fill out the following form available in **English** or in **Spanish** and provide the required documentation to apply for this grant. The deadline to submit an application is October 31, 2017.

Protecting your Family

If you are eligible for benefits under a Local 338 Benefits Fund Plan, you have a death benefit that would help your family financially should you experience a tragedy while you are a Local 338 member. We strongly urge all eligible members to designate a beneficiary (or beneficiaries) for the Local 338 Death Benefit to make sure it is paid to the person, or persons, you wish to receive it.

There are three easy ways that you can designate your beneficiary by using your "My Local 338" Member Portal. To find the form, log onto your Portal at https://my.local338.org/Home, click on "Forms & Documents," then click on "Death Beneficiary Form." To submit the form, you can:

- Print, complete and sign the form, and mail it back to the Fund Office.
- Or you can scan or photograph the completed, signed form, and email it as an attachment to the Fund Office through the Member Portal's secure "My Messages" section.
- You can also call the Fund Office at 516.294.1338, Ext. 1776, to request that we mail the form to you.

Taking the First Step

42 year member of Local 338, Fred Berman, met with us to share his story about his struggle facing alcoholism to recovery. Fred, who works at ShopRite in Commack overcame this struggle beginning with the help of the Member Assistance Program (MAP) and he has now been leading a sober life for almost 26 years. He wants to spread his message to his fellow members that it is possible; and while "your life might not get better right away, it will get different."

He started working straight out of high school as a wagon collector, then climbed up the ladder to a full-time position in the frozen department. While he was a hard worker, he was also not living a sober, clean life. One day, he was referred to MAP, and his supervisor told him that he needed to do what he had to do in order to get better—his job would be waiting for him when he got back. So, Fred made the call.

MAP connected Fred to a 28 day rehabilitation program in Rhinebeck—all expenses paid, under one condition—completion. At the time, the program was around \$10,000 and he knew he needed to finish out the program. While it was not an immediate recovery, he noted about a month later that he did not and would not fall backwards. 26 years later, he continues to attend AA meetings and remains strong with this support. Even when the going got tough, with ups and downs that life may bring, he never felt the need to go back.

Fred openly talks about the help he received from his union with feelings of gratitude for the opportunity MAP gave him to improve his quality of life. He understands from personal experience that making that phone call is scary, and it's something new, but he also knows that making that phone call was one of the best things he could have done to get sober.

He said, "The one thing I can guarantee is if you don't call, you're not going to know... We've all got to start somewhere and I would recommend [MAP] to everybody." Today, Fred is a dedicated Local 338 Shop Steward who strives to make sure his co-workers feel supported and protected and also to encourage any member struggling with personal problems to contact Jennifer Lipack at (516) 294-1338 ext. 1304 for assistance.




